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Redistricting Process

Step	Description
Two Initial Hearings	Held prior to release of draft maps.
September 8 & November 10	Education and to solicit input on the communities in the Districts.
Census Data Release Mid/Late August	Census Bureau releases official 2020 Census population data.
California Data Release	California Statewide Database releases California's official 'prisoner-
Early October 2021	adjusted' 2020 redistricting data.
Two Draft Map Hearings December 8 & January 12	Two Public Hearings to discuss and revise the draft maps and to discuss the election sequence.
Map Adoption	Final map must be posted at least 7 days prior to adoption.
By April 17, 2022	Map adopted via ordinance.*

Redistricting Rules and Goals

1. Federal Laws

Equal Population Federal Voting Rights Act No Racial Gerrymandering



2. California Criteria for Cities (rank ordered)

1.Geographically contiguous

2.Undivided neighborhoods and "communities of interest" (Socio-economic geographic areas that should be kept together)

3. Easily identifiable boundaries

4.Compact

(Do not bypass one group of people to get to a more distant group of people)

Prohibited:

"Shall not favor or discriminate against a political party."

3. Other Traditional Redistricting Principles

Minimize voters shifted to different election years

Respect voters' choices / continuity in office

Future population growth

Preserving the core of existing districts



Defining Neighborhoods

1st Question: What is your neighborhood?

2nd Question: What are its geographic boundaries?

Examples of physical features defining a neighborhood boundary:

- Natural neighborhood dividing lines, such as highway or major roads, rivers, canals and/or hills
- Areas around parks or schools
- Other neighborhood landmarks

In the absence of public testimony, planning records and other similar documents may provide definition.





Beyond Neighborhoods: Defining Communities of Interest

1st Question: What defines your community?

- Geographic Area, plus
- Shared issue or characteristic
 - Shared social or economic interest
 - Impacted by county policies
- Tell us "your community's story"

2nd Question: Would this community benefit from being "included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation"?

• Or would it benefit more from having multiple representatives?

Definitions of Communities of Interest may <u>not</u> include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.

Beyond Neighborhoods: Communities

Under the California Elections Code, "community of interest" has a very specific definition in the context of districting and redistricting cities and counties:

A "community of interest" is a population that shares common social or economic interests <u>that should be included within a single district for</u> <u>purposes of its effective and fair representation</u>.

Communities of interest do not include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.

(emphasis added)



- Used to review, analyze and compare maps, not to create them
- Includes overlays of "community of interest" and other data

September 8, 2021	1 st Public Hearing	
November 10, 2021	2nd Public Hearing	
	Mapping software released to the public.	
Mid-October 2021	*Estimated time depending on Census data	
December 1, 2022	Maps due from the public.	
December 8, 2022	3rd Public Hearing	
January 5, 2022	Publish Draft map(s)	7 Days prior to adoption
January 12, 2022	4th Public Hearing and Council adopt District map. Must be completed no later than April 17, 2022	The 4th hearing could also be the adoption hearing
April 17, 2022	Deadline to adopt and submit map to Registrar
